The June meeting in Minneapolis provided the 264 attendees the chance to meet with old friends and colleagues, be introduced to new friends and colleagues, hear about some of the latest research in the field, and have stimulating discussions. Many of us look forward to our Annual Meeting in June as an opportunity to experience a welcoming and academically engaging environment, and I hope everyone enjoyed the meeting.



The last time the Annual Meeting was held in Minneapolis was in 2012 for the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Meeting, and that meeting featured special additions to the usual program. # Day 1: Mon, June 17

#### Advanced Methods Workshop

The Advanced Methods Workshop provided an informative and stimulating start to the 2019 Annual Meeting. **Jonathan Snowden** and **Kelly Reavis** (Oregon Health & Sciences University) led this year's session, which focused on the application of causal inference

methods to perinatal epidemiology topics. The workshop was highly interactive and featured a series of hands-on, practical exercises. Many thanks to our presenters!

#### Keynote Address

Lisa Bodnar (University of Pittsburgh) and Matthew Fox (Boston University) kicked off the opening session of the Annual Meeting with their engaging keynote address entitled "What the Hashtag? Using Social Media to Extend Your Reach as an Epidemiologist." Their presentation outlined ways in which epidemiologists can leverage social media platforms (e.g., Twitter, podcasts) to promote active discussion of their own work and those of their colleagues. They also described how these platforms provide an important source of instrumental and social support to epidemiologists around the globe. # Day 2: Tues, June 18

#### Roundtable Discussions

Three engaging roundtables provided a great start to the second day of the annual meeting.

Pauline Mendola (NICHD) discussed environmental influences on reproduction, Cande

Ananth (Columbia University; PPE Editor-in-Chief) and Mark Klebanoff (Ohio State

University; AJE Associate Editor) moderated a roundtable entitled "Meet the Editors," and

Sarah Keim (Ohio State University), Courtney Lynch (Ohio State University), and Lauren

Wise (Boston University) moderated an open discussion regarding career and funding advice.

### Plenary Presentations

The plenary sessions featured a broad range of topics with relevance to parents, children, and families. Themes included *fertility and fecundity* (e.g., pregnancy loss, in-vitro fertilization), *pregnancy health* (e.g., placental characteristics, preeclampsia), *maternal behavioral health* (e.g., cannabis, opioid use), and *social determinants of health* (e.g., public policy impacts; racism; neighborhood characteristics). Thanks to all of the presenters for an excellent series of talks!

#### Symposium – NEW IN 2019!

For the first time, the SPER Annual Meeting included a member-initiated symposium in the plenary program. This year's symposium was organized by **Natasha Nassar** (University of Sydney) and featured a series of presentations that population-based, linked datasets to address topics in reproductive, perinatal, and pediatric epidemiology. Presenters addressed a range of exposures (e.g., delivery circumstance, birth defects) and outcomes (e.g., miscarriage, neurodevelopmental disorders) using this methodology and represented

investigative teams from Australia, Norway, and the United States. Thanks to Dr. Nassar and the symposium participants for your stimulating contributions to the meeting
